# Animals as Sentient Beings

77th OREGON LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY--2013 Regular Session

Sponsored by Senators COURTNEY, PROZANSKI; Senator STEINER HAYWARD

CHAPTER .....

AN ACT

Relating to animals; creating new provisions; amending ORS 87.159, 167.320, 167.322, 167.325, 167.330, 167.332, 167.347 and 167.348; and declaring an emergency.

#### Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. The Legislative Assembly finds and declares that:

(1) Animals are sentient beings capable of experiencing pain, stress and fear;

(2) Animals should be cared for in ways that minimize pain, stress, fear and suffering;(3) The suffering of animals can be mitigated by expediting the disposition of abused animals that would otherwise languish in cages while their defendant owners await trial;

(4) The suffering of animals at the hands of unlicensed animal rescue organizations that are unable to provide sufficient food and care for the animals can be reduced by requiring such organizations to comply with regulations;

(5) The State of Oregon has an interest in facilitating the mitigation of costs of care incurred by persons and government agencies that provide treatment for impounded animals;

(6) Use of preconviction civil remedies is not an affront to the presumption of innocence; and

(7) Amendments to current law are needed to ensure that interested parties are afforded adequate notice and an opportunity to be heard and thus cannot unduly delay or impede animal lien foreclosure and preconviction forfeiture processes through unfounded due process claims. *"Animals are sentient beings capable of experiencing pain, stress, and fear;*










# Emergency situations: "Hot cars" laws







Brown announced today that he had created an Animal Cruelty Prosecutions Unit, which will work closely with the newly formed New York City Police Department's Animal Cruelty Investigations Squad (which assumed the ASPCA's law enforcement function in July 2014) in pursing allegations of animal cruelty, abuse and neglect in Queens County.



ANIMAL LEGAL DEFENSE FUND MODEL LEGISLATION: COURTROOM ANIMAL ADVOCATE PROGRAM (CAAP) LAW

Be It enacted by the People of [State]:

#### SECTION 1.

(a) In any prosecution under sections **[animal cruelty laws]<sup>1</sup>** of the general statutes, or in any court proceeding pursuant to sections **[animal cruelty laws]<sup>2</sup>** of the general statutes or in any other criminal proceeding regarding the welfare, care, or custody of an animal, as defined in **[relevant stat-ute]<sup>3</sup>**, the court may order, upon its own initiative or upon request of a party, or counsel for a party, that an advocate be appointed to represent the interests of the animal, whether living or dead.

(b) When a court orders that an advocate be appointed to represent the interests of an animal, as defined in [relevant statute]<sup>4</sup>, the court may appoint such advocate from a list provided to the court, by [designated state body]<sup>5</sup>, of designated attorneys, and law students under the supervision of attorneys, pursuant to subsection (c) & (d) of this section. It will be at the discretion of the Court to appoint or remove the advocate. The decision by a court to appoint an advocate to represent the interests of the animal may be made at any stage of proceedings, at or after arraignment.


#### **RESOLUTION REGARDING ANIMAL CRUELTY AND ITS LINK TO OTHER FORMS OF VIOLENCE**

**WHEREAS**, the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges (NCJFCJ) is an organization committed to upholding the rights of all parties and victims, the safety of all family members, and the safety of the community;<sup>i</sup>

WHEREAS, empirical research demonstrates a direct link<sup>ii</sup> between animal cruelty and interpersonal violence including intimate partner abuse,<sup>iii</sup> child abuse,<sup>iv</sup> and elder abuse;<sup>v</sup>

WHEREAS, 99% of pet owners consider their animals to be "companions" or "family members;"<sup>vi</sup>

WHEREAS, animal abuse can be used as a tool to control other members of the household and is therefore inextricably linked to the abuse suffered by human victims;<sup>vii</sup>


