Are Shrimps Sentient?

What is Sentience?

Definition

Sentience is the **capacity to experience feelings**, such as pleasure or pain.

Question

"Does if **feel** like **something** to be this individual?"

Scientific Conclusions

EU's EFSA (2005)

"The scientific evidence clearly indicates that those groups of animals are able to experience pain and distress."

LSE Report (2021)

"We recommend that all cephalopod molluscs and decapod crustaceans **be regarded as sentient**."

Sentience in Legislation

UK Legislation

Animal Welfare (Sentience) Act 2022

The Act recognised the sentience of cephalopod molluscs and decapod crustaceans (including shrimps).

European Legislation

Austria - Animal Welfare Act 2004

Switzerland - Animal Welfare Ordinance Act 2008

Norway - Animal Welfare Act 2010



Welfare Concerns: Water Quality

Dissolved oxygen and ammonia levels, temperature, salinity and pH are key to the welfare of all aquatic animals, including shrimps.

Poor water quality can lead to compromised immune systems in shrimps (and in extreme cases, to death by suffocation or poisoning).



Welfare Concerns: Stocking Density

There is strong experimental evidence to suggest that reductions in stocking density indirectly improve welfare by improving water quality, reducing disease and stress, and increasing survival

Inability to express natural behaviours



Welfare Concerns: Stunning and Slaughter

Shrimps are typically slaughtered by either asphyxiation (suffocation), crushing or ice slurry (chilling).

In practice, many shrimps are simply placed into a crate and weighed, before having a layer of ice placed on top.





Welfare Concerns: **Eyestalk Ablation**

Some hatcheries still practice **cutting off the eyestalk of female shrimps,** to induce rapid maturation and spawning

This causes **prolonged pain**, **stress**, and **high mortality levels**

Shrimps have **adverse reactions** to ablation, such as tail flicking

Scale

2020 numbers - Rethink Priorities

Around **230** <u>billion</u> shrimps are living on farms <u>at any moment</u> resulting in a total of <u>440 billion</u> farmed shrimps being slaughtered for human consumption every year

When we include wild=caught shrimp, around **26** *trillion* **shrimps** are slaughtered for human consumption *annually*

Shrimp Welfare Project's Activities & Achievements





India

- Sustainable Shrimp Farmers of India (SSFI)
 - Knowledge sharing network for farmers
 - Water quality checks, farm visits by technicians, online consultations for farmers
 - Directly helped 120,000 shrimps. Indirectly helped 900,000 shrimps through online consultations.
- Pilot Study
 - Lower Stocking Densities = lower risk, lower investment, stabilised profits



Vietnam

- Outreach
 - Vietnam Shrimp Farmers Magazine
 - Conferences and seminars
- Research: Collaboration with Tra Vinh University (funded by UoS/OpenPhil)
- Corporate Engagement: MoU with Sofina (UK) and Taika (Sofina's producer in Vietnam): SWP to provide Taika with electrical stunner for humane slaughter (4,000 metric tonnes of L. Vannamei per year ~ 270 million shrimps per year)







Coordination

- Member of Asia for Animals Coalition and Vietnam Farm Animal Coalition
- Member of Eurogroup for Animals
 - Aquatic Working Group
 - Collaborating with and learning from other organisations, working on improving the welfare of aquatic animals influenced by the EU
 - Aiming to ultimately incorporate shrimp welfare standards into EU legislation

Research

Primary

- Electrical Stunning study, with University of Stirling
- Low Stocking Density study, with TNJFU university in India
- Consumer Research (400 surveyed)
 - "They are sentient beings and deserve not to suffer" - 37% to 66.5%
- Addressing aquatic animal welfare gap in Vietnamese education system

Secondary

- Shrimp Welfare Report
- Shrimp Supply / Demand
- Farmer Incentives

Corporate Outreach

- Over 1 billion shrimp affected per annum
- Commitments from medium to large producers:
 - Agreement to us electrical stunning
- Facilitating commitments by retailers to improve shrimp welfare
- Aquaculture Stewardship Council (ASC) Welfare Standards: Shrimp Technical Working Group



Shrimp Welfare Project's Challenges



Some challenges:

- Unsupportive legal frameworks
- Probability of enforcement
- Limited consumer awareness
- Varying production systems (intensiveness) and country
- Intensification
- Hard to intervene in major production countries that have few links to welfare-favourable import markets
